Emporia's City Council held a Public Hearing on Tuesday, January 20, 2015, at 6:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Building, located at 201 South Main Street, Emporia, Virginia. Carolyn S. Carey, President of Council presided over the session.

1. Rezoning Requests – Southampton and Reese Streets

Mr. Thrower reported that Mark Yeattes, Sr. has submitted an application to rezone 208, 210, and 212 Southampton Street to R-2 Residential District. He stated that he was also proposing to build rental properties on those parcels. He also stated that the City Administration is also proposing to rezone several properties in that same block to R-2 Residential District. He further stated that all the properties were currently zoned C-1 Commercial District and are identified as tax map parcel numbers 163-1-3-19A, 163-1-3-19, 163-1-3-20, 163-1-3-21, 163-1-3-22, 163-1-3-23, 163-1-3-24, 163-1-3-25, 163-21-1, and 163-21-3.

Mr. Thrower stated that the properties proposed to be rezoned are a mix of vacant lots and lots with existing homes. He also stated that the properties with existing homes are considered non-conforming, per Section 90-12 of the Zoning Code. He further stated that the properties in the immediate area are primarily residential in nature and are zoned both R-2 Residential District and R-3 Residential District. He stated that the large parcel directly across

the street from the lots proposed to be rezoned are zoned C-1 Commercial District and also owned by the City.

Mr. Thrower reported that the properties proposed to be rezoned are currently zoned C-1 Commercial District. He also reported that according to Section 90-76 (a) of the City's Zoning Code "C-1 commercial districts shall be for the conduct of retail and general commercial business establishments to which the public requires direct and frequent access and are characterized by constant heavy traffic and by noises of congestion..."

Mr. Thrower stated that Mark Yeattes, Sr. and City Administrations are proposing to rezone the aforementioned properties to R-2 Residential District. He also stated that per Section 90-72 (a) of the City's Zoning Code "R-2 districts shall be composed of quiet, residential areas plus certain open areas where similar residential development appears likely to occur. He further stated that the regulations of this R-2 district are designed to stabilize and protect the essential characteristics of the R-2 district, to promote and encourage a suitable environment for family life, and to prohibit all activities of a commercial nature. He advised that the development shall be limited to single unit dwellings, providing homes for the residents plus certain additional uses such as schools, parks, churches, and certain public facilities."

Mr. Thrower stated that according to the City's 2015-2035 Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Map, all the aforementioned properties were designated as "Medium-Density Density Residential." He also stated that the Comprehensive Plan described "Medium-Density Density Residential" as "neighborhoods or areas, which allow a greater density and variation of housing types. He further stated that the permitted uses included one and two-family dwellings and townhouses. He stated that the plan designated medium-density residential use in some of the older neighborhoods. He also stated that the smaller lot sized in these areas generally prevail, as well as a pedestrian oriented environment. He further stated that the older neighborhoods contained a diverse housing stock and include homes of modest size as well as larger homes."

Mr. Thrower stated that per section 15.2-2223 of State Code, the overall purpose of a locality's comprehensive plan is to guide and accomplish a "coordinated, adjusted and harmonious development of the territory which will, in accordance with present and probable future needs and resources, best promote the health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity and general welfare of the inhabitants."

Mr. Thrower reported that Section 15.2-2284 of State Code lists the relevant factors to consider in rezoning applications. He also reported that every proposed rezoning should be accompanied by an analysis of how the amendment will satisfy one or more of these factors. He further reported that a locality was not required to consider all nine factors in each zoning decision.

Mr. Thrower stated that the most pertinent factors applicable to these requests involve the existing use and character of the properties, including other properties in the immediate area, as well as the Comprehensive Plan. He also stated that as previously stated, homes currently sat on some of these properties and are used for residential purposes. He further stated that the remaining parcels were vacant. He reported that the properties in the immediate area are predominately zone R0=-2 Residential District. He also reported that in terms of the Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Map, the properties proposed to be rezoned are designated as "Medium-Density Density Residential." He further reported that the properties in the

immediate neighborhood area are also primarily identified as “Medium-Density Density Residential” on the Future Land Use Map.

He recommended that the rezoning requests be approved, and the properties be rezoned to R-2 Residential District. He stated that at the January 13, 2015, meeting the Planning Commission voted 7 to 2 to recommend approval of the rezoning requests.

Councilwoman Carey asked if there was anyone present who wished to speak regarding this matter.

Ruth Koch, of 310 Southampton Street, Emporia, Virginia addressed Council stating that she was in objection to the rezoning request for Southampton and Reese Street because it is one of the challenging areas of the City. She also stated that she is concerned with the crime rate, loud noise, fighting, property not being kept up and other illegal activities that takes place in this area. She further stated that if you brought more rental properties to this area, it might cause more problems.

Herman Harris, of Southampton Street, Emporia, Virginia addressed Council stating that he was in objection to the rezoning request for Southampton and Reese Street. He also stated that when he purchased his home in 1956, it was one of the best areas in the City of Emporia to live. He further stated that he had watched this area go down the hill over the last 10 years. He stated that he is concerned with the crime rate and area not be safe.

With there being no more comments to come before City Council, Councilwoman Carey declared the first public hearing closed and proceeded to the second public hearing.

2. Architectural Compatibility Review – 210 School Street

Mr. Thrower stated that Carrying the Cross Ministries seeks architectural compatibility review approval to demolish its building located at 210 School Street. He also stated that this property had been cited for property maintenance violations and is deemed as an unsafe structure by the City’s Code Enforcement Officer. He further stated that the Circuit Court of Greenville County has authorized the City to demolish the building should the property owners not do so willingly.

Mr. Thrower reported that Section 90-80 (k) of the City’s Zoning Code requires the Planning Commission to review the proposal for architectural compatibility and forward its recommendation to City Council. He also reported that City Council was given the authority to make the final determination.

Mr. Thrower stated that he recommended that Council, approve this request. He reported that the Planning Commission voted 9 to 0 to approve this request at the January 13, 2015 meeting.

Councilwoman Carey asked if there was anyone present who wished to speak regarding this matter.

With there being no comments to come before City Council, Councilwoman Carey declared the second public hearing closed.

15-08. Zoning Code Amendment Request – Architectural Compatibility Reviews

Mr. Thrower reported that the City was awarded \$719,596.00 in grant funding through the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development for our Belfield Business District Revitalization Project. He also reported that a substantial portion of that funding has

been allocated to improving building facades in the project area. He further reported that architectural design work was now underway.

Mr. Thrower stated that in order to expedite the review and approval process for building facades receiving grant funding as part of the Belfield Business District Revitalization Project, staff recommended Council to amend the architectural compatibility review section of the City's Zoning Code. He also stated that the proposed amendments would authorize the Zoning Administrator to approve building façade plans that are initially approved by the Department of Historic Resources (DHR). He further stated that this would eliminate the requirement of submitting all plans to the Planning Commission and City Council for review and approval.

Mr. Thrower stated that the other proposed amendments sought to differentiate the review and approval process for minor and major alteration projects that fall outside of the Belfield Project. He also stated that minor alterations would be subject to review and approval by the Zoning Administrator. He further stated that the minor alterations included modifications such as awnings, landscaping, lighting, roofing, paint colors, and signage. He stated that the Zoning Administrator was presently given expressed authority to approve paint colors, and signage. He also stated that the Major alteration would continue to require the Planning Commission to make architectural compatibility recommendations to City Council. He further stated that the final decision-making authority would continue to be vested in City Council.

He recommended that Council send the proposed Zoning Code amendments to the Planning Commission for review and recommendation. He also recommended that Council authorize conducting a public hearing on the proposed amendments at the February 17, 2015 meeting.

Black History Month
February 1-28, 2015*

Whereas, February is recognized nationally as Black History Month and Dr. Carter B. Woodson, a distinguished African American author, editor, publisher and historian, is acclaimed “Father of Black History Month”. Dr. Woodson believed that African Americans should know their past in order to participate in the affairs of the country; and

Whereas, Black History Month acknowledges both past and present African and African-American icons whose courage, sacrifices, and relentless efforts have sought to improve the quality of life for all in the name of justice, honor and freedom; and

Whereas, such noted African-American icons as Ida B. Wells, the renowned writer, teacher, women’s suffragist and anti-lynching crusader; and Rosa Parks, whose famous decision to remain in her seat symbolized the spirit of the Civil Rights Movement, have made imperative contributions to our society; and notable local African Americans as Joseph C. Bond, a mortician, was the first African American to serve on Emporia City Council and a founder of the local NAACP branch; Dr. Willie Joyner, a physician and entrepreneur, owned a medical building, a movie theatre, and rental properties; Dr. Joseph Macklin, a pharmacist, was the first African American druggist to manage his own business; Charles Harris, a mechanic, was the first African American to own and operate a service station; Edward Westwood Wyatt, an advocate for improved school conditions for African Americans and a zealous educator, legacy lives on as the first African American High School (E.W. Wyatt High School) was named in his honor; Charlie Stephen Thomas, a businessman and a founder of the local NAACP branch, operated a grocery store across from Greensville County Training School to provide snacks for the students, since there were no cafeterias at that time; Etta Reavis, a homemaker, provided hot meals and shelter for local teachers at R.R. Moton Elementary School; Elizabeth R. Allison, Reverend and Mrs. Willie Curley, Sr., Annie Green, and Helen Kindred provided shelter and meals for the teachers on the North side of town; George C. Williams, a local farmer, purchased a bus to transport students and teachers to school that resided in the county; and

Whereas, the Honorable Mary L. Person was elected as the first African American female to serve on Emporia City Council, made history again when she was elected on November 6, 2012, as the first African American and first female to serve as Mayor for the City of Emporia; and

Whereas, it is essential to learn from the many lessons of history from world renowned leaders as well as the contributions of local African Americans to continue the pursuit of our Founding Fathers’ vision of liberty, justice and equality for all; and

Now, Therefore, I, Mary L. Person, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the City of Emporia, Virginia do hereby proclaim February 1-28, 2015 as Black History Month in the City of Emporia.

**Setting Forth the City of Emporia's Commitment
To Make Healthier Options Easily Accessible**

WHEREAS, the City of Emporia has the ability to affect the health of its residents; and

WHEREAS, high rates of costly chronic disease among both children and adults are correlated to environments with few or no options for healthy eating and active living; and

WHEREAS, more than half of Virginia's adults are overweight or obese and therefore at risk for many chronic conditions including diabetes, heart disease, cancer, arthritis, stroke, and hypertension; and

WHEREAS, one in three youth in Virginia is overweight or obese; and

WHEREAS, more children are being diagnosed with diseases linked to overweight and obesity previously seen only in adults, such as Type 2 diabetes and heart disease; and

WHEREAS, the current generation of children are expected to have shorter lives than their parents due to the consequences of obesity; and

WHEREAS, obesity takes a tremendous toll on the health and productivity of all Virginians; and

WHEREAS, the annual cost to Virginia – in medical bills, workers compensation and lost productivity – for overweight, obesity, and physical inactivity exceeds \$3 billion; and

WHEREAS, teens and adults who consume one or more sodas or sugar sweetened beverages per day are more likely to be overweight or obese; and

WHEREAS, supporting the health of residents and the local workforce would decrease chronic disease and health care costs and increase productivity; and

WHEREAS, the City of Emporia ranks 126 out of 133 in health outcomes and 131 out of 133 in health factors; and

WHEREAS, 34% of the adult population of the City of Emporia is obese; and

WHEREAS, 27% of the population of the City of Emporia is food insecure;

NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED that the City Council hereby recognizes that obesity is a serious public health threat to the health and wellbeing of adults, children and families in the City of Emporia, and a commitment is needed to put healthy choices within reach of all residents. While individual lifestyle changes are necessary, individual effort alone is insufficient to combat obesity's rising tide. Significant societal and environmental changes are needed to support individual efforts to make healthier choices. To that end, the City of Emporia adopts this Healthy Eating Active Living resolution:

- Facilitate the upkeep of community gardens and farmers markets to increase access to healthy food, including fresh fruits and vegetables;
- Include healthy goals and policies related to access to healthy food in the general plan update;
- Examine racial, ethnic, and socio-economic disparities in access to healthy foods and adopt strategies to remedy these inequities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Community Health Advocacy Team (CHAT) will report back to the City Council annually regarding steps taken to implement the Resolution, additional steps planned, and any desired actions that would need to be taken by the City Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Jan Harrell, Economic Development Manager, shall work with HEAL Cities & Towns Campaign Staff to explore HEAL policies and to identify those policies that are suitable for the City's unique local circumstances.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Community Health Advocacy Team (CHAT) will report back to this Council with recommendations not later than sixty days from the date of this Resolution.

The City has received a risk management grant from VML Insurance Programs in the amount of \$1,156 to purchase two gas monitors for our utility plants. In order for the City to utilize these funds, you must appropriate them into the FY15 budget via the attached ordinance.
